ROCHDALE BOROUGH COUNCIL PRESCRIBED ALTERATION TO SANDBROOK CP SCHOOL, ROCHDALE STATUTORY PROPOSALS

Notice is given in accordance with section 19(1) of the Education and Inspections Act 2006 and the School Organisation (Prescribed Alterations to Maintained Schools) (England) Regulations 2013 (2013/3110) that Rochdale Borough Council, Children's Services, Number One Riverside, Smith Street, ROCHDALE, OL16 1XU, intends to make a prescribed alteration to Sandbrook CP School.

3. The date in which the proposed changes will take effect in terms of both the buildings and additional place provisions:

1st September 2016.

5. What is proposed?

The proposal is to permanently enlarge Sandbrook CP School to increase the pupil intake from 60 to 90 places from September 2016 onwards. Sandbrook CP School currently has an overall capacity of 480 places and this enlargement would mean the school would have a capacity of 690.

6. School capacity and places- current pupil numbers and admissions- (distinguishing between compulsory and non-compulsory school age pupils), age range, sex, and special educational needs (distinguishing between boarding and day pupils) for whom provision is currently made:

Sandbrook CP School has 493 pupils on roll from Reception to Year 6 based on the October 2015 school census. The current age range of the children is 3-11 and includes a nursery provision for 28 full time equivalent children.

7. Why do we want to make the change(s)?

Reasons for the expansion of places

7.1 Rochdale Borough Council needs to make sure there are enough school places for those who need them, taking account of demographic growth and change, and demand. There has been a high level of increased demand for school places in the Rochdale Township as a result of both increased births and movement into the Township. The proposal to increase the number of school places at Sandbrook CP School will make sure there are enough school places available for families within a reasonable distance of this popular and successful school.

7.2 The proposal is to enlarge Sandbrook CP School by providing an additional 30 places in each new year group. The enlargement of the school would be to increase the admission number for each new successive year group to 90, from the current number of 60 places available.

7.3 Additionally, the planning proposals for New Housing within the Rochdale Township, within close proximity to the school will ultimately impact the school place demand at the school.

Quality of Provision

7.4 The current OfSTED report for Sandbrook CP School was published in June 2013 and the school was judged as 'Good'. The increase in the number of available places is not considered to impact adversely on the quality of provision.

7.5 The advantages to the school and the children will be:

• Opportunities for young people to interact with a wide range of peers, and to prepare for secondary school;

• Capacity to develop a strong leadership team which will share the responsibility of knowing children and their families individually, and have direct and empowered links with the Head teacher and governors when necessary;

- Flexibility of organisation due to multiple year groups and a significant budget;
- Opportunities for staff to specialise and offer high quality support to colleagues;
- Capacity to retain high quality staff by offering a wide range of experience and consequent promotion opportunities within one organisation; and


• Opportunities to offer a very wide range of extra-curricular activities due to the range of talents and interests of the staff.

7.6 The Governing Body of Sandbrook CP is committed to upholding the standards and ethos of the School. Through the Leadership and Management Team and alongside the Governing Body, the school aspires to provide an 'outstanding' education to all of the children in its community. It is helpful that the expansion will be on a progressive basis enabling the school to plan ahead, step by step, ensuring that all is in place as each additional class, in each year group, arrives. The school will maintain all staffing ratios: resources for which are provided through the school funding formula, and hich will be increased accordingly each year as numbers grow.

8. The need or demand for additional places- a statement and supporting evidence about the need for school places in the area including whether there is sufficient capacity to accommodate additional pupils in the current schools:

8.1 The Pupil Projections for the Rochdale Borough highlight the need for additional primary school places within this area. The current figures tabled below, show that for the 2016/17 admission year, there are just enough places available for the expected number of Reception children with little margin for flexibility. Additionally, from the 2017/18 admission year, the birth data indicates that there are significantly more children born in the Township compared to the places available. Therefore, the need for additional primary school places in the Rochdale Township is required with effect from 2016/17 admission year.

8.2 In June/July 2015 the Local Authority consulted on the need for extra Reception class places in the Rochdale Township. The proposal to enlarge Sandbrook CP School will provide sufficient additional places in a locality where there are particular pressures. The extra places will not adversely affect demand at nearby schools.



*Data taken from January 2015 Census.

8.3 Sandbrook CP School is a popular and successful school. There is a high level of demand for places at the school in each year group. The data above shows there is a need for further reception class places in the Township up to 2017/18 school year. Maps to show the distribution of births are attached in Appendix 1. These demonstrate a high level of demand in the wider Kirkholt and Balderstone area. Providing more places at the school will help more parents from the Kirkholt area to access a place at this school.

8.4 Consultation undertaken:

A period of 4 weeks public consultation was undertaken between 8th October 2015 and closed on 4th November 2015. To bring the proposal to the attention of interested parties a Public Notice was published in the Rochdale and the information was also published on the Rochdale Council Website. Additionally the following bodies and persons were circulated with the relevant information:

- parents, carers and children at Sandbrook CP School;
- the governing body and staff at the school;
- Headteachers and governing bodies of all Rochdale Borough Schools
- Secretaries of Recognised trades unions
- Rochdale Borough Councillors
- MPs for Rochdale Borough
- Manchester Church of England Diocese
- Salford Roman Catholic Diocese
- The Methodist church
- Rochdale Youth MP and Children's Champion,
- Sandbrook Children's Centre

8.5 Responses to the Consultation:

Meetings with parents and with staff have taken place at the school, and there has also been a meeting with the School Council. There were 45 responses in total, of these 17 were supportive, 9 not supportive and 19 responses which are undecided but highlight comments or concerns without indicating support or otherwise. In brief the key points raised were:

* that there would be more places available for parents;

* concerns about traffic and parking; and

* concerns about the effect on Hall spaces because of PE Curriculum and providing lunches.

8.6 Part of the feasibility being undertaken is to look at the school travel plan and the travel parking concerns to see whether there is a workable way forward. The feasibility will also look at the accommodation requirements, which will take account of concerns raised.

9. Interim arrangements - details of the schools or further education colleges, taking the following into consideration:

-the provision that is to be made for those pupils who receive educational provision recognised by the local authority as reserved for children with special educational needs; and

The Local Authority aims to plan well in advance to ensure that the school, other users on the site and the contractors can work together to minimise disruption on site. The building contractors will be familiar with working on school sites and will be audited on considerate construction.

- a) Careful consideration has been given to the additional teaching spaces required to ensure that an increase of pupils on roll does not negatively impact on the teaching and learning of existing pupils or new admissions. The class sizes will not increase as a result of the additional primary school places to ensure that this increase in places complies with regulations regarding adult to pupil ratios.
- b) The increased place capacity will help to alleviate any concerns with regards to local children as well as acknowledging parental preference.

15. Travel requirements and provision of travel costs- details of the length and journeys to alternative provision and the proposed arrangements for travel for pupils to other schools including how the proposed arrangements will mitigate against increased car use:

A school travel plan will be produced to help reduce the impact of increased pupil numbers over the next few years by encouraging sustainable patterns of travel to school.

16. Capital

The capital cost of the proposals will be met by the Local Authority from capital grant resources already available. Approval for expenditure was given by Cabinet on 30th November 2015 and because contracts for the work have not been agreed the amount available is commercial in confidence. This will help secure value for money in procurement of the project. The site is in Council Ownership.

17. Implementation of the Proposals

Rochdale Borough Council as promoter has responsibility for implementing the proposals.

18. Public Sector Equality Duty

The proposals are aimed at improving access to special school provision for those pupils and students who need it. They will improve scope for parental preference with more special school places being available. An Equality Impact Assessment has been prepared and this is attached as Appendix Two.





1. What is the purpose of the function/strategy/policy/project assessed? (Briefly describe the aims, objectives and purpose of the function/strategy/policy/project)

To permanently enlarge Sandbrook CP school from 420 places to 630 places with effect from September 2016

2. Who are the key stakeholders?

Sandbrook CP School, its parents, pupils, staff and governors; neighbouring schools, residents in Rochdale Township.

3. What is the scope of this equality impact assessment? That is, what is included in this assessment.

This Equality Impact Assessment covers the proposed enlargement of Sandbrook CP School

4. Which needs is this function/strategy/ policy/ project designed to meet?

In recent years there has been a continuing increase in the number of children born across the Borough, and who in turn will want Reception Class places. Data presented in the report for Rochdale Township shows there are different demand pressures across the township, and whilst provisional data indicates that there is a decrease in the number of children born for admission to primary school in September 2018, local demographic led demand pressure in the Kirkholt area justifies consideration of a permanent enlargement of Sandbrook CP School.

5. Has a needs analysis been undertaken?

Yes. Public consultation on the need for extra Reception Class places between 2016 and 2018 was undertaken between 24th June and 22nd July 2015. The consultation provided information on the expected number of children and the current number of places available. Proposals for meeting the extra demand were put forward, including consideration of a permanent enlargement of Sandbrook CP School.

6. Who is affected by this function/strategy/ policy/ project?

The residents of Rochdale Township, parents of children, staff and governors at the schools, other schools in the Township, Diocesan Authorities, Secretaries of recognised Trades Unions, elected members and the local MP.

7. Who has been involved in the review or development of this function/strategy/ policy/ project and who has been consulted? State your consultation/involvement methodology.

7.1 Cabinet on 5th October 2015 considered a report on the need for extra Reception class places across the Borough, following public consultation, and authorised consultation on the specific proposal to enlarge Sandbrook CP. Consultation on the proposed enlargement of Sandbrook CP started on 8th October and closed on 4th November. The proposal is to increase the admission capacity from 60 to 90 places in each successive new year group with effect from September 2016.

7.2 The arrangements for consultation on proposals such as these are set out in statutory guidance published by the Department for Education (DfE). There was a 4 week consultation period which included publicising the proposals on the council website and sending out letters to parents and staff of the school concerned. The details of the proposal were sent to all schools in the borough, secretaries of recognised trades unions, neighbouring local authorities, diocesan authorities, the Methodist church, local MPs, the Youth MP and Children's Champion, elected members and Sandbrook Children's Centre.

7.3 A period of 4 weeks public consultation was undertaken between 8th October 2015 and closed on 4th November 2015. To bring the proposal to the attention of interested parties a Public Notice was published in the Rochdale and the information was also published on the Rochdale Council Website. Additionally the following bodies and persons were circulated with the relevant information:

- parents, carers and children at Sandbrook CP School;

- the governing body and staff at the school;
- Headteachers and governing bodies of all Rochdale Borough Schools
- Secretaries of Recognised trades unions
- Rochdale Borough Councillors





THE NUMBER OF CHILDREN IN ROCHDALE TOWNSHIP

1. The graph below shows the number of children born in Rochdale Township since 1992/93. The overall trend has been one of declining numbers of children born between 1992/3 and 2000/1. From then there was an increase in the number of children born, to a peak in 2008/9. Since then there has been a gradual decline in births until 2010/11 with a further decline in 2013/14. Generally fewer children take places in the township than were born in the township. An average of these are between 5% and 7% as fewer children are taking up places.





PROPOSED ALTERATION:- EXTRA SCHOOL PLACES TO BE PROVIDED AT SANDBROOK CP SCHOOL, ROCHDALE.

The reason for this letter is to tell you that the Local Authority is considering the need for extra primary school places at Sandbrook CP School due to increased demand for primary school places within the Rochdale Township. The Local Authority would like to increase the number of places by 30 from September 2016 with a view for a permanent three form entry. Before it takes the decision to publish legal proposals, the Local Authority wants to hear your views about the proposals.

What is being proposed?

The proposal is to enlarge Sandbrook CP School by providing an additional 30 places in each new year group from September 2016. This enlargement of the school would increase the admission number from 60 to 90 from September 2016.

Why does the Local Authority want to do this?

The Local Authority feels that an extension to the existing Sandbrook CP School will provide sufficient primary school places within this part of Rochdale Township.

What would happen and when?

To enable the admission of extra children on the Sandbrook CP School site, the building will be extended and will provide an additional 3 classrooms and ancillary accommodation.

Is Sandbrook CP School the only school affected?

The Council needs to provide extra places in 2016 and 2017 in Rochdale Township. Sandbrook will provide 30 extra places in each of these two years. The admission number at Sandbrook has already been 90 in some recent years, and by continuing to do this means that the Local Authority must consider whether this should be a permanent arrangement. Sandbrook CP school is the only school involved in these proposals.

Who takes the decision?

After the close of the consultation, Rochdale Council's Cabinet will consider all responses received. It will decide whether to publish statutory proposals to increase the size of the school. If Cabinet decides to publish proposals, at the end of a further 4 week statutory representation period it will then make the final decision in accordance with Statutory Guidance and Regulations.

APPENDIX FIVE – Consultation Responses

Supportive Comments:

I think it's a good idea as more children can get the school they apply for and the children can get a good education.

CJ (Anonymous)

Worries about Traffic Problems parking and picking up/dropping off children.

HC (staff)

I want new generations to have a good education and a wonderful place to learn at Sandbrook. HM (Anonymous)

This year my child who loves Sandbrook Nursery and also a sibling in class 13 cannot get admission in Reception due to limited places. It is shocking for me.

JS (Parent)

My only concern is serving the children within the hour for dinner service. Also there is a lack of space in the dining room which is also used for *P*.*E* lessons before and after service. *KW* (staff)

There will be a distinct lack of car parking spaces, it is already difficult. P.E will be stretched to the limit, space / time will be an issue.

LH (Staff)

Parent of 3 going to Sandbrook. I'm happy for the school to be extended as long as parking isn't an issue, we need a bigger car park.

NA (Parent)

Although I do support the needs of the community, I would like to point out that additional parking must be provided for staff who work at the school. Many staff live too far away to travel by public transport.

SW (staff)

I agree but have concerns about a shortage of parking spaces, capacity of breakfast club, lack of staff and pupil toilets, PE facilities and outdoor space. SH (staff)

Unsupportive comments:

I don't support this because putting extra children into each year will increase massively and reduce time and quality with the children of here and now.

AB (Parent)

The safety of the children, parents and staff will be more at risk. The amount of cars already at the school is bad. It can take staff 10 minutes in a morning to find a parking space and that includes surrounding roads.

JS (staff)

It may well reduce the quality of teaching and increase workload for managerial staff. LZ (Parent)

Higher number of students would impact the teaching and learning within the school in a negative way. The particular area which the school is based can be very volatile and bringing more parents into an environment sich as this can lead to avoidable circumstances. *MP* (staff)

There is not enough car parking spaces. There are not enough toilets for staff and pupils. The yard is not big enough for children to play safely.

NB (staff)

This will have a huge impact on the children. We will need a new hall to accommodate lunch times. Car parking will be an issue and could lead to accidents involving parents, children and neighbouring residents.

NT (staff)

Far too many children at the school already. If numbers increase I will demand my child to be moved to another school. We disagreed with the initial increase and still feel it is inappropriate now.

PF (Parent)

Undecided Comments:

I have concerns in regard to the PE provision. We currently struggle to deliver PE as the demands for the space is tight. PE would be unable to deliver its curriculum under a canopy. PE space is at a premium will suffer. A new hall/bigger hall is needed. *AH* (staff)

We would need more car parking places. School hall is not large enough for PE and dinnertimes. AT (staff)

Concerns – adequate hall space for PE and lunchtimes. Parking is already a problem at busy times. Classrooms – Portacabins should not be a permanent solution. *AH* (staff)

Concerns – hall space – impact on lunch/PE/Assembly staff facilities (staffroom toilets) Carpark – already lack of provision. Facilities for intervention.

C I (staff)

My concerns would be lack of parking as it is already limited. Trying to feed over 600 children at lunchtime within one hour will have a knock on effect to lessons before and after lunchtime, especially PE. Limited parking could cause extra risks to Sandbrook children/staff. *CJ* (staff)

This will have an impact on...Toilets, hall space, support/teaching areas, lunch times, resources, staff room resources, microwaves/seating etc, car parking spaces, playground. CF (staff)

My concerns are that the hall is not big enough to fit all the children in for dinner in an hour and will have an effect on PE lessons before and after lunch.

CP (staff)

I am concerned about staff and parent parking. There are not enough spaces now and more pupils and staff would make this even worse. I am also concerned about getting more children through the lunch hall and the teaching of PE for so many classes, will the children get enough? CH (staff)

Concerns: car parking, lunch time to cater for all children, communications between staff, playground/PE areas – enough space? Facilities e.g. photocopying, printing, laptops for children etc.

CB (staff)

The concerns I have are lack of parking for an already overcrowded car park which will cause more problems for our children and staff and a knock effect for PE with only having one dining hall/dining room and trying to get over 500 children in for dinner in an hour. *EB* (staff)

Very concerned about lack of parking spaces. Theres not enough space for staff at the moment. Very dangerous. Not enough hall space to allocate 2 hours per week to every child. FH (staff)

I am very concerned about parking and safety of the children. There are not enough spaces now and the traffic flow outside the school is a danger. Dinner times and PE times will be a major issue. We need to ensure that all of the children still receive the best education and the best resources/ buildings etc.

KG (staff)

Concerned about lack of car parking space. Also parents picking up/dropping off schildren with cars (already manic). Lunchtime arrangements, use of hall for PE- need another hall and facilities for staff PPA time.

LW (Staff)

Very concerned about the early years playground with 90 children. It is too small and would need to be enlarged. Also car parking spaces, use of the hall for PE and lunches are other concerns. *MB* (staff)

Consideration needs to be taken for things such as staff parking this is already limited and we would be needing more, especially If additional classrooms take up some of the current spaces. Maybe staff only car park (barrier system). Playground space will there be enough extra if there are extra classrooms. Lunch times – these are already very busy/rushed, how will they work with additional children, without impacting on lesson time.

Mrs M (staff)

PE will be affected. We need another hall to cater for 2 hours each child. Currently we do not really have enough space with a hall and a dinner studio.

There will not be enough staff toilets.

The staff workroom will need extending, as 4 computers will not be enough.

Car parking will be an issue if we have more staff.

We will need more first aiders to cater for the increased number of children. Anonymous (staff)

We would need a larger car park and an extra classroom – not another porta cabin, which reduces the children's playing area in the yard. Staff toilets would also be an issue. *RA* (staff)

Concerns about parking and drop off area. Will school have enough PE and dining hall space? With extra classrooms provided, will additional learning support areas for interventions be provided. Extra cloakrooms and toilets for children and staff needed. Unsure if the school will retain its community feeling – too many pupils /staff.

SC (Staff)

Car Parks are already an issue – extra traffic would be a great risk. Impact on lunches and PE as only one hall. Impact on service of lunches. TA (staff)

Dear Robert,

I am writing on behalf of Broadfield Governing Body. We have concerns regarding the impact on Broadfield Community Primary if the proposed enlargement of Sandbrook goes ahead. As a school we have never been full and as a result have a high transient population with a high number of Hard To Place pupils. This has a negative impact on standards in the school making it increasingly difficult to meet government targets.

Currently we have 427 pupils on roll. 42 are P/T Nursery places. We therefore have 35 places available (Reception to Year 6) and 10 places in Nursery.

How are we going to permanently fill the places in our school if other local schools have increased places to offer?

I would welcome your view on our concerns.
