ROCHDALE BOROUGH COUNCIL PRESCRIBED ALTERATION TO KINGSWAY PARK HIGH SCHOOL STATUTORY PROPOSALS

Notice is given in accordance with section 19(1) of the Education and Inspections Act 2006 and the School Organisation (Prescribed Alterations to Maintained Schools) (England) Regulations 2013 (2013/3110) that Rochdale Borough Council, Children's Services, Number One Riverside, Smith Street, Rochdale, OL16 1XU, intends to make a prescribed alteration to Kingsway Park High School.

The expansion will take effect from 1st September 2017

5. What is proposed?

The proposal is to permanently enlarge Kingsway Park High School, Rochdale from 1200 places to 1350 places with effect from 1st September 2017. This would mean that the Published Admission Number would increase from 240 to 270 in each successive new year group.


6. School capacity and places- current pupil numbers and admissions- (distinguishing between compulsory and non-compulsory school age pupils), age range, sex, and special educational needs (distinguishing between boarding and day pupils) for whom provision is currently made:

Kingsway Park High School has 1061 pupils on roll from Year 7 to Year 11 based on the October 2016 school census. The current age range of the children is 11-16.

7. Why do we want to make the change(s)?

Reasons for the expansion of places

7.1 In line with national trends, from 2002 onwards there has been a continuing increase in the number of children born across the Borough. This 'surge' in the school population is working through the primary school sector and is now starting to impact on secondary schools as can be seen from the following graph..



The following table shows how this 'surge' translates into forms of entry. The Borough needs between 7 &16 forms of entry FE over the next 10 years.

- 7.2 In order to meet this demand the Council is proposing to expand Kingsway Park along with two other secondary schools (Matthew Moss and Falinge Park). However, the need for places is such that even with these expansions, 2 new secondary free schools will be needed (or 9-10 FE).
- 7.3 Housing is a major driver in the need for more school places. In addition to the 9000 new houses currently planned in Rochdale, a further 11500 houses are proposed as part of the Greater Manchester Spatial Framework GMSF.
- 7.4 The proposal is therefore to enlarge Kingsway Park High by providing an additional 30 places in each new year group.

Quality of Provision

7.4 The current OfSTED report for Kingsway Park High School was published in October 2013 and the school was judged as 'Good'.

The increase in the number of available places is not considered to impact adversely on the quality of provision.

- 7.5 The Governing Body of Kingsway Park High School is committed to upholding the standards and ethos of the School. Through the Leadership and Management Team and alongside the Governing Body, the school aspires to provide an 'outstanding' education to all of the children in its community. It is helpful that the expansion will be on a progressive basis enabling the school to plan ahead, step by step, ensuring that all is in place as each additional class, in each year group, arrives. The school will maintain all staffing ratios: resources for which are provided through the school funding formula, and which will be increased accordingly each year as numbers grow.
- 8. The need or demand for additional places- a statement and supporting evidence about the need for school places in the area including whether there is sufficient capacity to accommodate additional pupils in the current schools:
- 8.1 New pupil projections for Rochdale Borough and Township were published, consulted upon and updated during August-October 2016. For Year 7, the work indicated that the main drivers for more secondary places were the 'primary birth surge' (see 7.1 above) and new housing.
- 8.2 Housing
 - Across all four townships, the current housing programme comprises 720 units pa
 - In addition, the GMSF includes proposals for 2850 which would be within 2 miles of the school.
- 8.3 Currently years 7-11 each have an average of 237 pupils and Year 7 has 246. Spare capacity equates to only 1.2% (compared to the minimum of 5%.
- 8.4 Consultation was undertaken during Sep-Oct 2016 with schools (face to face meetings) and Townships (via committee meetings) and supports the need to expand.

The Local Authority aims to plan well in advance to ensure that the school, other users on the site and the contractors can work together to minimise disruption on site. The building contractors will be familiar with working on school sites and will be audited on considerate construction.

 - a) Careful consideration has been given to the additional teaching spaces required to ensure that an increase of pupils on roll does not negatively impact on the teaching and learning of existing pupils or new admissions. The class sizes will not increase as a result of the additional primary school places to ensure that this increase in places complies with regulations regarding adult to pupil ratios.
 - b) The increased place capacity will help to alleviate any concerns with regards to local children as well as acknowledging parental preference.
- 15. Travel requirements and provision of travel costs- details of the length and journeys to alternative provision and the proposed arrangements for travel for pupils to other schools including how the proposed arrangements will mitigate against increased car use:

A school travel plan will be produced to help reduce the impact of increased pupil numbers over the next few years by encouraging sustainable patterns of travel to school.

16. Capital

The capital cost of the proposals will be met by the Local Authority from capital grant resources already available. Approval for expenditure was given by Cabinet on 31st October 2016 and because contracts for the work have not been agreed the amount available is commercial in confidence. This will help secure value for money in procurement of the project. The site is in Council Ownership.

17. Implementation of the Proposals

Rochdale Borough Council as promoter has responsibility for implementing the proposals.
