The removal of sixth form places inevitably reduces parental and student 'choice'. The Governing Body and the Local Authority believe, however, that the Sixth Form at Middleton Technology School is not sustainable and that not financially viable. Furthermore, by attempting to retain the 6th form there would be a significant negative impact upon its 11-16 provision at a time when standards have significantly risen. Sixth Form provision for Middleton Township will continue to be provided through a combination of provision- Rochdale Sixth Form College, Hopwood Hall College, St. Anne's Academy and Cardinal Langley RC High School.

PROPOSED CLOSURE OF MIDDLETON TECHNOLOGY SCHOOL SIXTH FORM PROVISION IN 2013.

The reason for this letter is to tell you that following a request from the Governing Body of the school, the Local Authority is considering the closure of the Sixth Form at Middleton Technology School at the end of August 2013. Before it takes the decision, the Local Authority wants to hear your views about the proposed closure.

What is being proposed?

The proposal is to close the Sixth Form Provision at Middleton Technology School on 31st August 2013. Sixth Form provision for Middleton Township will continue to be provided through a combination of provision- Rochdale Sixth Form College, Hopwood Hall College, St. Anne's Academy and Cardinal Langley RC High School. There are other post-16 providers in adjacent local authority areas.

Why does the Local Authority want to do this?

The Governing Body has looked at the educational and financial viability of continuing with the small sixth form provision at the school. The small numbers of students, together with changes to the funding arrangements for school sixth forms means that the school cannot afford to continue with a sixth form. The Local Authority has considered the views of the Governing Body and in the interests of the school has agreed to consult on proposals to close the sixth form.

What would happen and when?

The Sixth Form would close on 31st August 2013. The last admission to year 12 would have been September 2012, but there was insufficient demand to justify starting new courses. Those students who have started their Year 13 programme this September will be able to finish their studies at the school unaffected.

Is that the only change proposed by the Local Authority?

Yes. The only change the Local Authority is consulting on is to close the Sixth Form.

How will the closure be managed?

The Governing Body will plan the curriculum and staffing implications of the change in the context of managing the school budget.

Briefing Note to Governors

Proposals to close the Sixth Form provision

Background

In 2005 the Government laid out its vision for the 14-19 phase of education in England in the coming years and set out its aims:

- introduce greater choice of what and where to study and make it easier to combine academic and vocational learning;
- retain GCSEs and A levels as cornerstones of the new system;
- introduce new specialised Diplomas, including academic and vocational material, covering each occupational sector of the economy. The Diplomas will be available at levels 1 (foundation), 2 (GCSE) and 3 (advanced);
- require that anyone achieving a Diploma at level 2 must have functional English and maths at level 2;
- put employers in the lead through Sector Skills Councils, in designing specialized Diplomas which provide the right grounding for work and further study, supported by higher education and the QCA

In 2006 Middleton Technology School benefitted from a "presumption". Which was a policy aligned to the White Paper that came directly from the Prime Minister's office which allowed highly successful schools to set up six form provision and become 11-18 schools. At the same time there were a number of "policy collisions" .Building Schools for the Future BSF was becoming a faint possibility on the horizon for Rochdale but the price of consideration was an 11-18 sponsored academy within the project. The now defunct Learning and Skills Council (LSC) conducted a StAR of post 16 provisions in Rochdale which concluded there was a need for better L3 (academic) provision in the borough. Thus it was agreed that there would be a "competition" for a new academic sixth form in Rochdale Town centre and that there could be a "mixed economy" in Middleton because of the "collision" of the BSF academy policy, the presumption and the StAR.

During 2006/7 the school planned a collaborative 6th form offer with the St Anne's Academy and CLHS. It was agreed that MTS's would be a purely vocational offer that consisted of diploma lines to begin with in Engineering and Society, Health and Development (SHD) with other lines in Manufacturing and ICT to follow to match the 14-19 agenda for education and our offer would blend with SAA which would be focused on the Arts and CLHS which would be a L3 academic offer to provide the learners of Middleton with a choice without duplication or over provision.

Present Position

From a high point of over 70 learners in the two diploma lines at L2 and L3 we have been unable to grow the sixth form provision to a viable size and find ourselves for September 2012 with only 9 applications to the sixth form provision, 8 in Engineering

and 1 in HSC. We have also only 17 students in Engineering /SHD in Year 13 going forward not including the Y13/12 CLHS students we have for Sociology (approximately 25). This position is financially unviable and an unacceptable use of resources in that it is neither efficient nor effective and we are charged with making our educational provision both efficient and effective. The reasons for this are several fold:

- With the change in Government has come a change of emphasis about Diplomas
 the requirements for these lines of learning 14-19 have been removed and the
 qualifications themselves do not carry the currency that they were developed for.
- We have not been able to expand the scope of our offer significantly or offer other diploma lines which is unattractive to a broad range of students
- We cannot expand our offer to include a range of L3 academic qualifications as this will cause duplication and overprovision within the borough with the development of the Rochdale Sixth Form
- Funding arrangements for post 16 are changing
- Similarly the new funding body YPLA is clear that the school cannot meet its success criteria for funding based on the courses offered
- We cannot attract the calibre of students required to complete the Advanced Diploma in Engineering (aimed at top flight students with excellent maths and physics qualifications) and have had to offer L3 BTEC Engineering in its place and again have had to switch the SHD to BTEC H & Social Care because of the reluctance of HEI to accept Diploma qualifications.
- Whilst we had success with our beginning students accessing HE and University places, nearly all of the students who have accessed vocational provision have continued with us without L2 Maths and English qualifications and have struggled to achieve these awards by age 18/19.
- Students have not readily wanted to access provision at other schools. The
 exception to this has been L3 Sociology which we have offered to compliment
 the offer at CLHS and their students have come here to study.
- No student from MTS or CLHS has accessed any provision from SAA and we have seen a reduction to zero of their students accessing provision at MTS or CLHS
- Collaboration despite our efforts has proved unsuccessful

Implications

- There are no staffing implications and no teaching staff affected by the proposals other than minor internal staff deployment arrangements managed by the school
- There are no other HR or personnel implications for the LA that arise from this
 closure
- There are no financial implications other than the school receiving less revenue funding in line with the reduction in numbers

Middleton Technology School

- There is no sex, disability or race discrimination issues which arise from the changes proposed.
- · There are other providers within less than 3 miles of the school
- With no intake in September 2012, existing students will complete their studies without impact to them.
- All students who are to access post 16 education, including those with Special Educational Needs, are accommodated by sufficient places at Rochdale Sixth Form and other post 16 providers
- Whilst the removal of the sixth form ,it could be argued lessens choice in the provision of this type of post 16 provision, the reality is, that all , but a very small number, wish to exercise their choice at providers other than MTS.
- The school will be able to continue to be Outstanding and to focus on the very high achievement of students 11-16 and its pursuit of excellence for every child.
 For post 16 learners the opportunities available through the sixth form college and other providers will be much broader than those available within the school.
 Thus resources within the school and across the borough are appropriately targeted to be effective and efficient (and thus VfM).
- The school is currently benefitting from the BSF programme and thus there are no capital issues. The net capacity will be consistent with that required for an 1100 place 11-16 school.

Recommendation

That the school close it's sixth from provision with effect from 31st August 2013

PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 The Governing Body of Middleton Technology School at a meeting to be held on 5th September will request that the Local Authority, as the Admission Authority for the school, discontinues the Sixth Form at the school with effect from 31st August 2013.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 Cabinet is asked to consider the request from the governing body of the school and to Authorise public consultation on the proposal

MAIN TEXT INCLUDING ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED/ CONSULTATION CARRIED OUT

- 3.1 The Governing Body of Middleton Technology School has considered a report from the Headteacher setting out the implications for the school in continuing with sixth form provision. That report set out the background to the establishment of sixth form provision at the school, it's place in post 16 provision in Middleton Township and the Borough as a whole. The provision at Middleton Technology School was a vocational offer, consisting initially of 2 diploma courses in Engineering, Society, Health and Development and planned to be followed by other diplomas in Manufacturing and ICT. These courses were to be part of a collaborative Sixth Form offer in the Township in partnership with St.Anne's Academy and Cardinal Langley High School.
- 3.2 In the past the Sixth Form has had up to 70 students in the 2 diploma courses at Level 2 (GCSE equivalent) and Level 3 (A level equivalent). However, the school has

not been able to grow the provision to a viable size, and for September 2012 there were only 9 applications to the Sixth Form so it has not been possible to offer any places. There are only 17 students going forward into Year 13 in September 2012. This is not financially viable, nor is it an effective use of resources by the school.

- 3.3 If the proposal to discontinue the sixth form provision is to proceed there needs to be consideration of the implications for current and future potential students. As indicated above there has been no recruitment to Year 12 for this September. Those students continuing in to Year 13 will be able to complete their programme of study. For future students who wish to access post-16 education these can be accommodated by a range of post 16 providers- other school sixth forms, Hopwood Hall College and Rochdale Sixth Form College.
- 3.4 The arrangements for consultation on Prescribed Alterations to schools are set out in Department for Education (DfE) statutory and other guidance. Consultation would comply with these arrangements and a draft timeline for consideration, determination and implementation of the proposals is set out as Appendix One.

4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

4.1 Funding for sixth form provision is through the Education Funding Agency, and there are to be changes in how the whole of post-16 funding is determined and allocated. The number of students in the sixth form means that the provision is not financially viable.

5. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

5.1 The Local Authority is the Admission Authority for the school and is responsible for undertaking consultation, publishing any statutory proposals and determining those proposals in accordance with statutory and other guidance.

6. PERSONNEL IMPLICATIONS

6.1 The governing body is responsible for managing any staffing changes and meeting any costs associated from their decision to seek closure that might arise following a proposed closure of the Sixth Form.

7. RISK ASSESSMENT IMPLICATIONS

7.1 There are no specific risk issues for members to consider arising from this report.

The removal of sixth form places inevitably reduces parental and student 'choice'. The Governing Body believes, however, that it is not sustainable and that it is financially unviable. Furthermore, by attempting to retain the 6th form there would be a significant negative impact upon its 11-16 provision at a time when standards have significantly risen. The evidence in Rochdale is clear: at post-16, students are increasingly choosing to attend a college rather than school-based provision. Sixth Form provision for Middleton Township will continue to be provided through a combination of provision- Rochdale Sixth Form College, Hopwood Hall College, St. Anne's Academy and Cardinal Langley RC High School. There are other post-16 providers in adjacent local authority areas.

- A key consideration for the school is the financial viability of the current sixth form provision, because of the effect that has on resources available to the rest of the school. The low numbers interested in joining the sixth form, together with changes in funding arrangements for sixth forms means that it is no longer cost effective to continue the programmes.
- 2. Under education legislation the school is responsible for the management of the school and the curriculum. The Local Authority is the Admission Authority for the school and is responsible for making any changes to the age range of the school-which is what this proposal entails.
- 3. There are no links to other service areas.

3.State the data that you have considered for this assessment and any gaps in data identified. What action will be taken to close any data gaps?

- The sixth form provision at Middleton Technology School is a vocational offer, consisting initially of 2 diploma courses in Engineering, Society, Health and Development and planned to be followed by other diplomas in Manufacturing and ICT. These courses were to be part of a collaborative Sixth Form offer in the Township in partnership with St.Anne's Academy and Cardinal Langley High School.
- 2. In the past the Sixth Form has had up to 70 students in the 2 diploma courses at Level 2 (GCSE equivalent) and Level 3 (A level equivalent). However, the school has not been able to grow the provision to a viable size, and for September 2012 there were only 9 applications to the Sixth Form so it has not been possible to offer any places. There are only 17 students going forward into Year 13 in September 2012. This is not financially viable, nor is it an effective use of resources by the school.
- 3. If the proposal to discontinue the sixth form provision is to proceed there needs to be consideration of the implications for current and future potential students. As indicated above there has been no recruitment to Year 12 for this September. Those students continuing in to Year 13 will be able to complete their programme of study. For future students who wish to access post-16 education these can be accommodated by a range of post 16 providers- other school sixth forms, Hopwood Hall College and Rochdale Sixth Form College.
